# **Approval of Minutes**

Minutes from 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter meeting dated December 2024.

The motion was approved by all board members present - Motion carries.

#### **Previous Business**

- Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) Program Updates
  - TNR is ongoing December 2024 (6 cats), session this week (approx. 10 cats).
  - Traps are currently out; cats are trapped, spayed/neutered the next day, and released the following day.





- Residents where traps are set are informed cats will be returned, but no formal release signed.
- TNR conducted regardless of cat ownership (community cats included).
- Current surgeries are paid via the approved funds; providers (Freed's to start; Michiana Humane Society soon) are reimbursed for their services. Estimated number of cats covered per \$6,000 allocation to each group is unclear and under review.
- TNR schedule is monthly with each partner, aiming for two sessions monthly by April.

## **Kennel Expansion**

- Presentation by Andrew Matanic:
  - Technology and Facilities Department is handling kennel expansion.
  - Plans drafted for 30x64 ft building, with separate office and kennel areas.
  - Utility locate/drawings in progress; architectural floor plans forthcoming.
  - Construction to be partly in-house; anticipated project start: July 2025.

#### **New Business**

## Donations and Public Outreach

- Public donates supplies (towels, food, bowls, kennels); outreach occurs via Facebook and email (<u>mcac@michigancity.com</u>).
- Difficulty accessing Animal Control's Facebook (still under prior director), but efforts are ongoing to regain admin rights for better communication.

# Animal Transport & Liability

- Discussion of situations where Animal Control transports privately-owned injured animals:
  - Owners remain responsible for associated care and costs.
  - Friction and staff abuse reported when owners are not clear on this
    policy.





- Suggestion: Require a release if animals are handed over for euthanasia or medical decisions.
- Need to review procedures with city attorney—transportation liability, legal ability to move animals, and potential need for fees.

#### • Discussion:

 Who handles deceased deer? That is handled by the street department.

### **Public Comments:**

- Judy Coall (resident) gave feedback on the TNR program:
  - Advocates expansion and awareness—relies on word-of-mouth currently as some do not use Facebook.
  - Requests information also be posted to website/radio; seeks improved scheduling and volunteer coordination.
  - Noted out-of-pocket expenses averaging \$3,500/year for her personal TNR work.
  - Suggested exploring other programs (e.g., Silver Stray) and developing a formal volunteer program.





- Recommendation: Have formal releases for trap placement/return obligations to manage confusion and liability.
- TNR Program Details Discussed:
  - Most cats receive microchips and vaccines (distemper, rabies), ear-tipping for identification; some shelters offer more services than others.
  - Standard TNR appointment cost mentioned: roughly \$60/cat (Humane Indiana).
  - Suggestion for volunteer transport help to free up Animal Control resources and to grow capacity.

#### **Board Comments:**

- Launch of new City and Police Department website scheduled for Friday, including dedicated Animal Control page for public information.
- Ongoing discussions to expand animal intake contracts to additional foster/rescue facilities (requires ordinance amendment).
- Recognition of Animal Control Officers for TNR program management. Also recently achieved empty kennel for the first time in years, showing progress.
